Pastor's Page "Covenant and Vending Machines"

The year was 1918, and the Spearfish Methodist Church had made a radical decision. They decided to dig a basement.

We are one of the few United Methodist churches that is actually still worshiping in our original building. It's hard to recognize with all of the updates through the years, but it is still the same building. Out on the east side of our building near the stained glass windows, you can see our 1889 cornerstone. Our first sanctuary was so simple. There was no plumbing. There was no heating system other than the stove that warmed the sanctuary. There was no concrete sidewalk. There was no mowed lawn. There was only a dirt street. And the church grew...and grew...and grew. It became a deep and important part of the Spearfish community.

And in 1918 the men of the church partnered with the Boy Scouts and dug a basement. They sent the boys underneath the church in that small crawl space with shovels and buckets and began to dig down. When there was enough room, the men joined them.

Why? Why a basement?

Because there was no dedicated fellowship space. They had to have room to meet for Sunday School classes and potluck dinners. They had to have space for meetings and conversations. The role of the church had changed so that it could serve the community more effectively.

Now...let me ask you this question: What kind of God do you worship?

A Covenant God? Or a Vending Machine God?

A Vending Machine God is one in which you put something in and then expect God to give you what you want. "Look, God! I prayed to you. Now give me what I asked for." "Hey, God, I was in worship for the last month




straight. Now I want you to listen to me more." "Dear God, I put something in the offering plate, can that help me get a few of the bad marks scratched off in your Book of Life?" Alright, that's exaggerating, but you get the

point!

The truth is our American culture believes in so many ways in a Vending Machine God. And that changes our behavior as Christians. We ask a whole lot more, "What's in it for me?" And then we live with a distant, one-sided deity. God is just out there when we need a God. In effect we wind up saying, "Don't call us. We'll call you."

Or do you worship a Covenant God? Belief in this



kind of God draws us into twosided relationship. A covenant is a two-sided promise. You know, like a marriage. In a wedding the bride and groom both promise each other to be loving and supportive in a MUTUAL

relationship. THAT is what our relationship with God is! A two-way, two-sided, mutual friendship. God loves us, and we love God in return.

But wait...now ask this question: What kind of CHURCH do you belong to?

A Covenant Church? Or a Vending Machine Church?

A Vending Machine Church is one in which we put something in and simply expect the church to always be there to give us what we want. It can be a very one-sided relationship. Now, this isn't always a bad thing. There are times when we have deep needs, and the church has the deep human resources to help meet those needs. We love reaching out to help people, to be present with people, to guide people. THAT is why we dug a basement in 1918! We created a better facility to meet the needs of the church and community as we reached out to bring the love of God in deep and real ways to Spearfish.

Or are you a part of a Covenant Church? Belief in this kind of church invites us into a powerful, two-sided relationship in which we invest ourselves into the community of Christ and then experience the results of that relationship. Like a healthy marriage, both sides invest love in each other.

I want to invite you to be a part of a Covenant Church. That's who we are as a congregation. In 1918 we dug a basement so that we could reach out to our community and invite everyone in to a relationship with God and with this church. That's still who we are. You are invited into a faith community where you have the opportunity to work, to study, to grow, to become an active part in an active relationship.

A Covenant Church worshiping a Covenant God. May this always be who we are.

What is the difference between praise and worship?



Understanding the difference between praise and worship can bring a new depth to the way we honor the Lord. Throughout the Bible, the commands to "praise the Lord" are too numerous to mention. Angels and the heavenly hosts are commanded to praise

the Lord. All inhabitants of the earth are instructed to praise the Lord. We can praise Him with singing, with shouting, with dance, and with musical instruments.

Praise is the joyful recounting of all God has done for us. It is closely intertwined with thanksgiving as we offer back to God appreciation for His mighty works on our behalf. Praise is universal and can be applied to other relationships as well. We can praise our family, friends, boss, or paperboy. Praise does not require anything of us. It is merely the truthful acknowledgment of the righteous acts of another. Since God has done many wonderful deeds, He is worthy of praise.

Worship, however, comes from a different place within our spirits. We read in Luke 4:8 that worship should be reserved for God alone. Worship is the art of losing self in the adoration of another. Praise can be a part of worship, but worship goes beyond praise. Praise is easy; worship is not. Worship gets to the heart of who we are. To truly worship God, we must let go of our self-worship. We must be willing to humble ourselves before God, surrender every part of our lives to His control, and adore Him for who He is, not just what He has done.

Worship is a lifestyle, not just an occasional activity. Jesus said the Father is seeking those who will worship Him *"in spirit and in truth."*

In Scripture, praise is usually presented as boisterous, joyful, and uninhibited, not somber or "joyless." God invites praise of all kinds from His creation. Jesus said that if people don't praise God, even the "stones will cry out." When the Bible mentions worship, however, the tone changes. We read verses like, "Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness" (Psalm 96:9). And, "Come let us worship and bow down" (Psalm 95:6). Often, worship is coupled with the act of bowing or kneeling, which shows humility and contrition. It is through true worship that we invite the Holy Spirit to speak to us, convict us, and comfort us. Through worship, we realign our priorities with God's and acknowledge Him once more as the rightful Lord of our lives.

Just as praise is intertwined with thanksgiving, worship is intertwined with surrender. We see in Luke 4:8, it is impossible to worship God and anything else at the same time. The physical acts often associated with worship—bowing, kneeling, lifting hands—help to create the necessary attitude of humility required for real worship.

Worship is an attitude of the heart. A person can go through the outward motions and not be worshiping. God sees the heart, and He desires and deserves sincere, heartfelt praise *and* worship. Let's all join in WORSHIP every time we come together, and then WORSHIP by ourselves by surrendering to God what is rightfully His. *John Elving, Worship Coordinator*

Council Highlights

There wasn't a Council Meeting in February but the following is the January 2018 Treasurer's Report:

- **Total General Fund income** for January 2018 was \$44,485 and expenses of \$43,693 leaving a difference of \$791. All bills and apportionments have been paid.
- ➤ <u>UMCOC income</u> for January was \$8285 and total expenses of \$5188.40 leaving a difference of

\$3096.60. An insurance premium of \$1587.75 boosted the expenses this month.

- ➤ <u>Children First</u> continues to be financially solid. Income for January was \$33,847.72 and total expenses of \$28,178.23 leaving a difference of \$5669.49. Children First is nearing the middle of the fiscal year and \$16195.53 ahead for the year.
- ➤ <u>Dreams income</u> was \$1702.15 bringing the balance to \$79,882.77. There were no expenses in January.
- ➤ The Parsonage Loan Repayment Fund started 2018 with a balance of \$21,551.55, including the transfer from the MCCI fund. Income for January was \$1998.75 bringing the balance to \$23,550.30. A payment was made in January of \$13,544.41 (principle) and \$455.59 (interest) totaling \$14,000. The balance as of January 31 is \$9550.30.
- ➤ <u>Missions</u> began the month with a balance of \$48,605.34 and there was income of \$4,220.44. Expenses for the month were high at \$22,337.49 because of upcoming mission trips. The ending balance for Missions is \$30,488.29

World Day of Prayer Service

Friday, March 2nd is World Day of Prayer 2018. World Day of Prayer is an ecumenical celebration of informed prayer and prayerful action. Join in the prayer service written by the women of Suriname, which invites us to explore Genesis 1,



the story of Creation, with the theme "All God's Creation is Very Good!" Concepts of climate change, natural disasters, pollution, and human abuse of the environment will be explored.

Invite your friends, family, and communities of faith to join the women of Suriname in prayer and song to support ecumenical efforts toward justice, peace, healing, and wholeness. MISSIONS

UMCOR Sunday

March is the month that we celebrate UMCOR – United Methodist Committee on Relief – knowing that our contributions ensure that there will respond in times of crisis to needs around the world.

An example is when cyclone Dineo roared through Mozambique about a year ago and seven people died, more than 50 were injured and thousands were displaced. UMCOR emergency grants to the UMC in Mozambique for food distribution and support in rebuilding of homes in the affected communities happened the day after the storm! Much emergency help is slow in arriving and being distributed. The reason UMCOR works so well is that the UMC is already in countries around the world and so structure is in place for relief efforts to begin.



This month's contributions support the administrative arm of UMCOR so that there is, already in place, a quick way to address a crisis around the world. This also makes any gifts to a particular emergency to

go directly toward that emergency in its entirety with no reductions for working out how to get the relief there.
