Pastor's Page

"Chicken? Egg?"

"It is by grace you have been saved, through faith - and this not from

yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no one can boast. For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."

Sooooo... which did come first? The chicken? The egg? We can go round and round on this, usually with some pretty good conversation and laughter. It's one of those unanswerable questions. But there is a Christian version that, although it still goes round and round, actually does have an answer.

Which came first? Faith? Good works?

This is not just a heady, ethereal question. It's not just a debate for theologians. It's a question that affects us each and every day.

Many of you know that our oldest daughter, Grace, and her husband Eamon live in northern Thailand. A while back, Colleen and I went to visit them in their city of Khon Kehn. The predominant religion there is Buddhism. Roughly 90% of the people follow the teachings of the Buddha. They are perhaps the kindest and most gracious people I have ever met. Their religion is ancient and fascinating. They do not have a set day of worship like in Christianity have with our Saturday nights / Sunday mornings. Their temples (called "watts") are open every day. You come and go and worship as you wish any and every day through the week. They are extremely religious not just in what they believe, but also in how they live and what they do. They absolutely believe that how you live right now counts in the life following this one. If you are strong and good here and now, you will be blessed in your next life. If you are abusive and negative here and now, you will definitely NOT be blessed.

One evening Grace and I were walking home through one of the central parks which is by a lake. By the water's edge was a dock. On the dock were buckets of fish....minnows, actually. For a cash donation you could purchase these fish and release them back into the lake. This was one small lovely example of how they simply live a life of good deeds. My daughter's Buddhist neighbors know their answer to the religious question of which comes first the chicken or the egg: Which comes first faith or good works? The answer for them, I believe, would be good works.


As Christians we take a different spin. Which comes first faith or good works? For us it would be faith. We hear the words of the writer of Ephesians. We are saved by grace through faith. "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works." Faith comes first as we learn to believe in God. That faith is never complete as we live our lives; there are always ways to grow deeper in faith. But then immediately, we are called into making our world a better place through the works we do.

We learn faith, and we do good stuff. We do good stuff, and then grow in faith. I love this circle!

The world needs your faith. The world needs your good works. There is so much to be done. May you be one of those who lives in God's grace and makes things

In 2020, our denomination will gather in Minneapolis for General Conference. The Host Operations Team is working on a special hospitality initiative to welcome every delegate, dignitary, bishop and spouse with a handmade scarf. **The goal?** To gather 10,000 scarves to be blessed at

the 2019 Annual Conference. Will you help? It's easy!

- Scarves should be hand-knitted or hand-crocheted. Since this is a Minnesota event, the scarves should be solid PURPLE yarn (Minnesota Vikings). No lavender or variegated yarn.
- 2. Yarn should be acrylic, so that it can be washed.
- 3. The pattern can be creator's choice, but sample patterns are found at https://www.dakotsumc.org/lydiaproject. Finished products should be 6-7 inches wide and *at least* 60 inches long. If fringe is added, the scarf should still be 60 inches in length before the fringe.
- When the scarf is done, place it in a gallon-size Ziploc bag. Include a tag (which will be provided to you). Contact Chris Davis for the tag and delivery of your scarf.

- 5. As you knit or crochet, pray for GC2020 and the recipient of your scarf.

Worship is a verb

I remember traveling in my car some time ago where the radio reception was spotty at best. Often times I will listen to some of the CDs I keep in the car for just such occasions. A lot of those CDs feature love songs from years past, many from 50 years ago or more. One of the things I noticed was that those love songs were different than many modern love songs. They tended to center much more on the object of love; that is, the particular person one is "in love" with, rather than upon

the actual experience of love and its accompanying feelings; which tends to be the focus of contemporary love lyrics.

Those older songs talked about "The Man I Love," "Michelle," "When I Fall In Love," even an old classic "O Danny Boy." The newer songs are things like "Hooked on a Feeling," "A Moment Like This," and "Make You Feel My Love."

But what do romantic lyrics have to do with Christian worship?

The shift from person-centered to experience-centered lyrics that one observes in romantic music and relationships has its parallels, it seems to me, when it comes to our relationship with God and how we worship Him. In other words, our public worship sometimes tends to center more on the good feelings we experience, or wish to experience in worship, than on the One we worship.

I am not saying that experiencing ecstasy as we encounter God's love for us is somehow wrong or something about which we must second-guess ourselves the moment we have a positive, emotional feeling as we worship. After all, is there anything greater than experiencing the reality of being loved beyond measure by God, and feeling the responding tide of love flowing back from ourselves to Him? Knowing and experiencing these things is clearly crucial to Christian worship. Think of King David who was so overcome in his worship that he danced in next to nothing before God!

The problem comes when critical masses of Christians take on a consumer attitude toward worship. That is, when questions such as, "What's in it for me?" become dominant in "the search for a more meaningful worship experience." Or when someone thinks, "I could get better if I went over there" or "Am I getting all I should from my worship experience?" Or more crassly: "Have I cut the best deal I could by coming to this church?"

This was very evident this past weekend as I watched people immediately react when a familiar song was started, or someone said, "Let's worship." It became very evident not only to me, but to others, that those people were concerned more about the acts and gestures of worship and less on the Lord being worshiped.

There are more than 250 times worship is mentioned in the Bible. It was so important that God wanted to make sure we understood its importance. As we go about our daily lives, we need to realize that worship is an all the time, never ending part of our life. We need to make God the only object of our worship.

When we worship, there is nothing wrong with showing emotions when we realize all that God has done in our lives. If we look at King David, he was so overcome with emotions that he danced before God in next to nothing. What was important to him was that he met God and worshiped Him.

Dr. William Loveless, in one of his publications, says about worship the very first question we should ask ourselves is, "Did I meet God during worship time?" When guests or visitors worship with this congregation, do they know that they in fact encounter God here? That's a question I ask myself all the time.

When it comes to Christian worship touching, evocative, and poignant as it may be and should be, what matters most is the One for whom and to whom it is all presented. It is our call to Him and above all His call to us that must in fact be heard when all Christians worship; or why in fact are we worshiping at all? And in the end, what quality of meaning will it all have? While we all too often use the word worship as a noun, which, according to the dictionary, it isn't, at its core it is a word of action, a verb, if ever there was one.

Council Highlights July 18, 2018

- **Treasurer's Report**... Total General Fund income for June was \$30,077.35 and expenses were \$28,763.56, leaving a difference for the month of \$1313.79. We did not pay apportionments in June, leaving us in arrears for 2 months. UMCOC income for June was \$5060.00 and expenses of \$1906.02 leaving a difference for the month of \$3153.98. Year to date balance for UMCOC is \$7054.51. Children First income was \$32,936.16 and total expenses were \$28,491.01 leaving a monthly difference of \$4,445.15. A reminder that the Children First fiscal year begins on September 1st. Dreams had income of \$1407.30 with no expenses bringing the Dreams balance to \$87,634.77. Parsonage Loan repayment income was \$1519.68 leaving the fund balance at \$12,859.04. Mission Giving beginning balance for June was \$20,660.92 with income of \$6327.36 and expenses of \$3989.37, leaving an ending balance of \$22,998.9.
- > Stewardship & Finance...We are reviewing some policies and making updates. These will be reviewed at the July council meeting. Karen reported that we have a rebate from the Conference for Pension and Health Direct payments. The amount is \$6962.10. Rebates have occurred in the past and recommendations have been made by S & F as to how they should be used. Karen recommends, since the church is behind in apportionment payments, that the rebate money be returned to the

- General Fund from whence it came. Continued discussion on the Dreams Fund and how it is to be spent.
- <u>Trustees</u>...Trustees are still seeking funds for Fellowship Hall tables, security lighting for the church and updating our door locks for the church.
- > <u>Staff Parish</u>...We hired a new organist, Church Financial Assistant, and facilitated the retirement party for Donna Golliher. We discussed how things are going for our Elisha Intern, Natasha. We will look at our current way of doing staff evaluations and possibly make some improvements this fall. We are looking into our current and future reimbursement for Children's First Staff.
- Missions...Pastor's Discretionary \$363, Benevolence Fund \$100, Service Projects \$194.36, Solar Oven Project \$900, UMCOR \$100, Caring Meals \$50, Hope Center \$50, Food Pantry \$20, Honduras VIM \$200, Tree of Life \$150, Elisha Project \$4200.
- Pastor...Summer months are used for catching up from the first half of the year and preparing for the second half. Projects on the table: Confirmation preparation, Ephesians Worship Series for July / August, working with Natasha as Elisha Intern, parsonage improvements, creating new enews format, NHSOS details, exploring options for fall Financial Peace University, preparing fall / winter worship series.
- Youth...Summer activities continue weekly when possible. Spearfish UMC was able to send 4 high school youth and 1 adult on the Conference Mission Trip to Racine, WI in June and the impact of the trip was deeply felt by our youth! Preparations are being made for the middle school mission trip to Spirit Lake Reservation in North Dakota in August. So far 7 youth and possibly 3 adults are planning to attend. Please pray for safety, health, and growing faith for the team.
- Memorial...The undesignated balance in the Memorial account is \$2,494.34. There haven't been any recent memorials.
- <u>Dreams...</u> The Dreams committee met on July 10 discussing the history and future of the fund. We also prepared a disbursement recommendation to present to the council on July 18.
- ▶ Discussion Items: Dreams Committee recommended payments of \$5000 each towards Fellowship Hall tables, external door locks, TV screens for sanctuary, and \$9000 for external lighting. These recommendations were approved. A sub-committee will develop recommendations for the pros/cons of making two funds (capital needs and mission/outreach) of the Dreams Fund. Pastor Scott presented his quarterly Pastor's Discretionary Fund report.
- Action Items: Council approved the policy (Policy for safeguarding of church revenue, Guidelines for Pastor's Discretionary Fund, Contribution Policy) updates as proposed by Stewardship & Finance.

Next meeting: Wednesday, August 15 at 6:30 pm. These meetings are open to everyone.
