# "Powerfully Intergenerational"

The next time you are in worship here in Spearfish, stop and

take a look around you. What are the ages of those who are in worship? In our congregation the youngest child was just born in September, and the oldest member is now 106. On any given weekend, we routinely have those in worship who are under a year old and also over 100 years old with every age bracket in-between represented. We have five complete, healthy generations present in our church. You will not see them in one place at one time, but they are here. I have a phrase that I love to use for this:

"Powerfully intergenerational"

We are a powerfully intergenerational church. And that is a powerful statement to make.

There are not that many places in our American culture right now that you can find a regular, healthy gathering of people that routinely involves five generations. We tend to splinter: the young are with the young; the older are with the older. But under our roof we do not simply encourage intergenerational interaction, we are lost without it.

A couple of Sunday mornings ago I watched one of our regular worshipers in Gathering Worship who is in his 60's walking around the sanctuary very intentionally greeting and shaking hands with each and every elementary student who was there that day. It was so fun to watch the interactions. No surprise, the kids were perfectly fine with this because it's not the first time it has happened. They loved it!

When we have a toddler with his/her parent in worship who gets fussy, it is not uncommon to see someone on the opposite side of the sanctuary quietly get up, walk all the way to the back and come up to that toddler. Very quietly, she will talk with the parent, pick up the child and go play with him/her in the fellowship hall while mom or dad finishes worship.

A new college student winds up sitting in worship. The first people who find that student are usually our

grandparents. Students sit down, and it's not uncommon for a grandma to have their hand out in greeting within seconds.

THIS is incredibly important. All through human history, generations have taught generations. THIS is who we are. In a nation where it is only too easy to spend your time with only those in your own age-bracket, we provide an environment where intergenerational interaction is normal and strong.

THANK YOU, Spearfish Church, for being powerfully intergenerational!

#### **Watching Over the Flock**

Did you know that October is National Church Safety and Security Month? Really??? A special month has been declared for church safety and security?? While the atmosphere of a church is to provide comfort, refuge, worship, and learning, we don't always have control of what happens during our time in the church. Medical and weather emergencies may occur and we need to be ready to respond.



In July and August, a number of church members were invited to attend

meetings in which we discussed the steps our church and its members should take in the event of an emergency. By walking through all areas and levels of the church, we learned the locations of: fire alarms, wheel chairs, first aid kits, phones (did you know you have to dial 9 to get an outside line?), safe areas (away from windows), the

AED, and fire extinguishers. We pulled the fire alarm and heard that signal and saw the flashing warning lights.

Now we would like to share with you what we learned. *During the weekend of October 12-13, tours of the church will be offered after all three worship services*. On the tour, you will have the opportunity to visit all four (did you know there were that many?) levels of our church and learn the location of fire alarms, wheel chairs, first aid kits, etc. You can help our church be ready to respond in case of an emergency.

A scavenger hunt sheet will be provided and door prizes given during drawings of completed scavenger hunt forms. Please plan to stay after one of the worship services and take a tour. It could make a difference to someone's life.

Prayer...Gracious Heavenly Father, we thank you for the blessings you have given us through our church building. We thank you that it is a place of comfort, refuge, worship, and learning for our church family and community members. Please keep it, and us, safe during our times together. Amen

#### **Council Highlights**

September 18, 2019

- TREASURER'S REPORT: The Parsonage and UMCOC Heating Upgrade loans have been combined as per wishes of our lender. The total loan is \$192,547.56. We will begin repaying at \$7,000 per quarter in October. For the month of August income for the General Fund was \$38,609.31 and expenses were \$44,765.17. The **General Fund** ended the month \$6,155.86 in the red. This was due to a big insurance payment and the fact that there were three payrolls in the month. The year to date balance is \$4.813.45 in the black with all apportionments paid through August. UMCOC income was \$3,350.00, and expenses were \$5,170.13, leaving the **UMCOC** Fund in the red \$1,820.13 for the month of August but still in the black \$10,278.73 for the YTD balance. A quarterly insurance payment was the cause of high expenses for August. Income for August for Children First was \$22,612.34, and expenses were \$39,714.46. **Children** First ended August in the red \$17,102.12 due to the insurance payment, the three payrolls, and the fact that August is a light month anyway. In addition, they had to be closed several days for the asbestos removal for the heating upgrade for **UMCOC**. August 31 is the end of the CF fiscal year and the final figure is \$4,636.00 in the black with \$8,000 borrowed from their Prior Years Fund. **Debt** Retirement/Capital Fund is a combining of the Parsonage Fund and the Capital Needs Fund together with the \$145,000 loan for the **UMCOC** heating upgrade. Since the parsonage and heating upgrade loans have been combined, the fund used to repay the loan is now called the **Debt Retirement/Capital Fund's.** Income for August is \$3,081.54 from pledged and unpledged income. Expenses were \$83,436.40 reflecting partial payment for the new boiler. YTD balance is \$79,043.88. Mission giving for August was \$1,688.00. **Mission** expenses (distributions) were \$3,099.38.
- **CHILDREN FIRST:** Children First is the Sept 2019 mission of the month, focusing on WE ARE CHILDREN FIRST because UMC owns and operates CF. There have been the following used to inform the congregation of what we do and why it is important: a newsletter article. highlights on the GPS, bulletin inserts, a snack list, verbal announcements, and a video by Miss Rose. We met with the Stewardship/Finance committee to present Children First budget (approved) and lost wages request during boiler asbestos removal (approved). No action was taken on insurance percentages or reimbursing lost tuition due to asbestos school closing. We requested free storage space (#12) and proposed a goal to increase wages and benefits for CF. The new school year is off to a busy start with all staff hired, a waiting list of families and few openings. The Children First Mission Statement follows: To support the director and staff of Children First in providing the best environment for all children; promoting a loving, safe learning experience geared toward full individual development. Children First Board Objectives are: approve the programming for the pre-school and child care center and its policies; approve the yearly budget and seek grant and endowment opportunities; work with the

Children First director in establishing vision and direction for this ministry to children and their families; and create avenues for the Spearfish United Methodist Church members and friends to be involved in the ministries of Children First

- HEALTH MINISTRIES REPORT: There will be two upcoming events sponsored by Health Ministry: Communion Prayer Station Training and a "Prepare to Care" Health Forum. On September 16, at 6:30 in the church parlor, persons interested in helping with communion or prayer stations are invited to come and learn about this powerful ministry. You are invited to help with prayer/and or anointing at the monthly prayer stations as it takes 10 people each month to help. It is very meaningful to help at the prayer stations; for both the people offering prayer and for the participants. On October 20 at 4:00 p.m. in the church library, AARP will present a Health Forum entitled "Prepare to Care." Most everyone has family or friends who are in need of extra help. This forum will give you the tools to best help. Care giving might be one of our most important Christian roles in life. A new Low Vision Group will begin meeting on the second Monday of each month. Anyone is welcome who has any kind of vision issues or has interest. This monthly program will be at 3:00 PM at the Spearfish Hickory House, North Dining Room (430 Oriole Drive).
- MEMORIALS REPORT: The following memorials were received: Jim McGilvery, \$20 deposited in Undesignated Fund; Gloria Boppe, \$520 divided half to Youth fund and half to Pastor's Discretionary Fund; and Lyle Bockwoldt, \$20 to Quilt and Craft group. Thank you notes were sent to all families. A memorial plaque has been mounted on the Memorial Wall. The balance in the Undesignated Fund is \$716.32.
- ✓ <u>MISSIONS REPORT:</u> Marilyn Halse, Gloria Borgman and Colleen McKirdy assembled the hygiene and school kits and will take them to the Mission Fest in Piedmont on October 14. In addition, we raised around \$1000 that will be sent along with them. Cornerstone Rescue Mission in Rapid City will be October's focus, and then November will focus on the Benevolence Fund.
- TRUSTEES REPORT: Trustees met on September 3rd. We gave permission to Spearfish Co-op Preschool to use the church's internet. We are looking into replacing tables in children's Sunday School rooms and currently are getting prices. Darrel Hahn is retiring from doing the lawn care for the church. We proposed a Darrel Hahn day, serving cake after church services, and the date will be announced later. We are also giving Darrel a gift certificate. The Trustees are preparing to tackle getting the church parking lot repaved and extend parking to the west side of the church with asphalt, including another entrance/exit to the northwest corner. John Kissack is getting quotes/plans for this work. The Trustees gave permission to repair /update the flame sign on the south side of church to LED. Foltz and Sons were selected at a cost of \$3899.06. The money will be coming from the Trustees' budget as a church upkeep line item. We are hiring Eric Hunt for snow removal again this year.

**WORSHIP REPORT:** The committee met on August 28. There was discussion about having a Wednesday evening service with a short discussion and suggestions given. Native American Sunday was then discussed. Some ideas to help in planning would be the Native American churches in Rapid City, Linda from Tree of Life, and Ray Buckley who is a friend of Pastor Scott's. The 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Service will be the weekend of September 28/29. On Saturday, September 28, there will be the BHSU Homecoming parade. There will be a concert on September 21 at 7:00 p.m. entitled Songs for Service. On that weekend there will only be an early service at 8:15 with food. Emma McKirdy-Wilsey and Kevin Nakajima are in charge. The committee then discussed The Discipleship Pathway which is Scott McKirdy's topic for his advanced study year. One example of how worship works into this was Saddleback Church and Doable Discipleship on YouTube with four classes: Basic; More about Faith; Service; and Sharing Faith.



**Discussion Items:** Pastor Scott brought to Council's attention that a member was questioning him about the UMCOC/Children First Building. He was specifically looking for the gift for the windows in 2013 and thought it was brought up at Charge Conference 2012, but he could not find it. He will keep looking. The windows were replaced in 2014. Action Items: There was a motion brought from the Stewardship and Finance Committee to approve the Children First budget. There was a question about a line item for prior years' funds, and Janelle and Peggy fielded the question about the \$4000 difference needed in order to retain quality employees with a small raise. Motion carried. The next motion from Stewardship and Finance concerned the Northern Hills Sources of Support Fund. They were asking for \$8,630.22 for operations through December 2019 from an original fund of \$50,000. Another question was about their start-up fees as well as where they are operating from. They were given \$3000 to start and the community gave \$2657 as well. NHSOS was reminded to work to get other churches

involved in this mission as well. Some council members remembered a verbal understanding to secure matching funds prior to getting a permanent place. Stewardship and Finance will be addressing the progress in November. The motion from Stewardship and Finance to release \$8630.22 was approved. The final motion from Stewardship and Finance was to pay Children First staff for pay during the asbestos removal. The total dollar amount was \$3025.78. The money will come from the Debt Retirement/Capital Needs Fund as an expense from installing the boiler. It will be a separate check for each employee who lost wages during that time. The motion to transfer the money was approved. **Learning/Planning.** Janelle shared the objectives from Children First Board as a possible focus for Council and the church. She shared that tuition and child care fees are raised in alternating years and figure at about 4%. The teachers are certified, and all staff take annual training. Children First usually employs about 20 people. She shared how hard it is to keep the younger staff who are child care workers because the fast food restaurants pay more money. The goal from her committee was as follows: Financially support Children First by paying a living wage to teachers and aides, commensurate with state and regional salaries, benefits, and provide mandated staff training. She also brought a list of ideas to share services with Spearfish UMC as well as financing small needs. Pastor Scott is still interested in creating and implementing Discipleship Pathway as an avenue for leadership in the church. Along that line, he shared it would be amazing to have our goals refined and ready to implement in time for Charge Conference. Kirk shared his ideas for each of the 5 pillars—family involvement, lay leadership, outreach, communication, and capital needs. The goals follow: create opportunities for family involvement; increase the number of trained lay leadership participants; create short/long term facilities plans; promote Spearfish UMC in the community; and increase/create communication to UMC members via social media. Council then decided to form subcommittees whether they meet in person or via email prior to next month's meeting. The Family Involvement Committee will be Janelle Jones, Brenda Swanson, and Penny Louks. The Lay Leadership Committee will be Pastor Scott, Rod Garnett, and Roberta Hilliger. The Outreach Committee will be Colleen McKirdy and Rod Garnett. The Capital Needs Committee will be the Trustees, Stewardship/Finance, and Kirk Easton. All committees

will form SMART goals to bring to council for approval.

The veteran wing continues to house over 250 veterans each year. Between the apartments, the Women & Children's Home and the Mission, almost 300 people are housed nightly.
