Pastor's Page

"The Drums of Peace"

"It is better to light a single candle than to curse the darkness."

And Russia invaded Ukraine. Russia will be held accountable and needs to be. How do we approach this in our faith and in our everyday living? The drums of war beat every day in our world. Tensions build and explode. They beat in Central American nations like El Salvador and the Honduras as corruption seem to take an upper hand. They beat in areas of Africa and Afghanistan and Yemen as tribal and national differences seem to be unsolvable. They beat around the world in dozens if not hundreds of locations and situations as violence erupts. They are beating fiercely in the Ukraine right now. We hear those drums in Kyev, Moscow, Washington DC, and in every capitol city in Europe.



How are we supposed to respond? In the face of conflict on an international level it seems that there is nothing we can do. It is tempting to simply give in and say, "Oh well... there's no way to stop war. Oh well... I'm only one person in a huge,

complicated world. Oh well... this just doesn't affect me. Oh well..."

It's tempting to say all of that, but I don't think it's acceptable. In his Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5, Jesus said, "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God."

It can seem that there is no way to stop a war. It can seem to be inevitable. It can seem overwhelming to each of us and all of us. It can seem to be all of these things, but even in the face of everything... even when the drums are sounding... we are still called by Christ to become peacemakers. Yes, you are just one person, but you are a person of great worth in God's eyes. You are a

person gifted and graced by God to work for God's Kingdom. You are just one person, but that does not mean that you must, by default, listen to the drums of war simply because that is what beats the loudest.

If you listen carefully, you will also hear a different sound. It is the sound of the drums of peace. There are thousands upon thousands of people in our world, (yes, in our nation) who are assertively working for peace through nonviolent resolution of our conflicts with other nations. Faith in action means living with personal integrity. To me the question rises from within: What do you believe, and what are you going to do about it?

Rather than simply sit by and feel that you have no control and no voice, you can become a peacemaker in your own situation. Will your efforts and actions change the world? Probably not, but perhaps they can change your part of the world. They certainly will change you. So, what can you do? Here are some thoughts:

- Begin with prayer. Actively pray for peace AND justice. The Bible tells us to pray unceasingly.
- Contact your senators, representatives, and president expressing your thoughts and feelings.
- Read, watch, and listen to keep yourself informed with accurate information.
- After finding your information, turn off the TV. Don't fill your days with negative news and pointless programming. Fill your days with proactive activities.
- Talk with others who share your same passions. Don't just remain isolated.
- Volunteer in your own community. When the conflicts of the world seem overwhelming and far away, it is a powerful thing to work hands-on with realistic issues close at hand.
- Spend time with your family. Peace in our world begins with peace in your own home.
- Sponsor a child in another country. Personally, I recommend the organization Compassion International as a reliable and effective way to do this.
- Be regular in your time with God. Find time for daily scripture reading. Worship each week.

Pray. Our life begins and ends in God, who is bigger and more powerful than any other issue or problem.

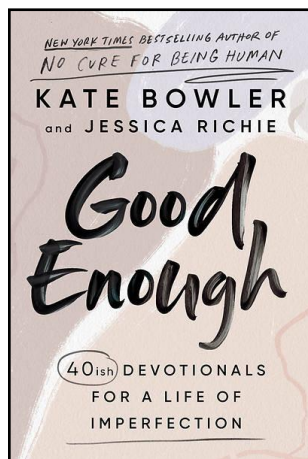
“Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.” Let me leave you thinking with this thought, a prayer written by United Methodist Bishop Woodie White:

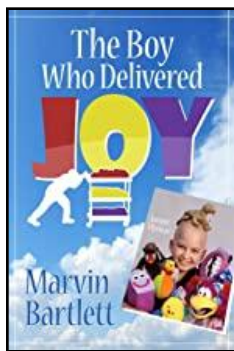

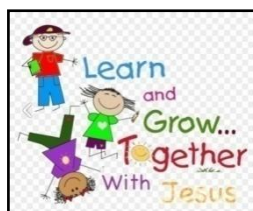

Council meeting was called to order by pastor at 7:35 pm on Feb 16, 2022, opening with prayer. New council secretary is Beth Bentley. Treasurer has resigned.

Investment Fund Distribution

The Stewardship and Finance committee recently distributed \$6,190.01 from the earnings of the Investment Fund of Spearfish United Methodist Church. Requests were submitted by Logan Brewer for \$1,000 and by Jacob Brewer for \$500 to assist with each of their Eagle Scout projects. Those were funded along with the remainder allotted for the Trustees project of carpet in two upstairs rooms in UMCOC (United Methodist Community Outreach Center).



In addition, there was a request from United Methodist Women to help fund members attending UMW Assembly. The estimated amount needed is \$840. The committee chose to pay that out of the Grace E Huck Endowment which has available \$1,121.58. This seemed very appropriate because UMW was important to Grace Huck, who was a retired pastor and active in this church for many years.

Did you know that our church has an investment fund that has grown from \$3,000 in 2004 to \$53,923 today?

The fund was created solely for charitable purposes for the development of religious, charitable educational activities, capital improvements, and non-recurring purposes not regularly budgeted for. The fund is invested with the United Methodist Foundation.

Some of our generous and forward thinking members have contributed over \$31,700 over 18 years to this fund. The interest and market value gained on the fund over the 18 years is \$34,010 and \$11,786.73 has been given out.

Every year after the 3rd quarter investment report is published the growth of the fund over the last year is calculated; then 75% of the growth is made available for distribution. Anyone in the church can submit a request for the funds to the Stewardship and Finance Committee in January. They must follow the guidelines for the fund. Over the last 18 years \$11,786.73 has been distributed for Youth Camps, Children First events and scholarships, the UMCOC heating upgrade, church roof reserve, and Seminary Scholarships and other charitable projects.

Just as the faithful servant that invested the 5 talents in Matthew 25:23 the fund continues to multiply and be fruitful.

UMC Benevolence Fund

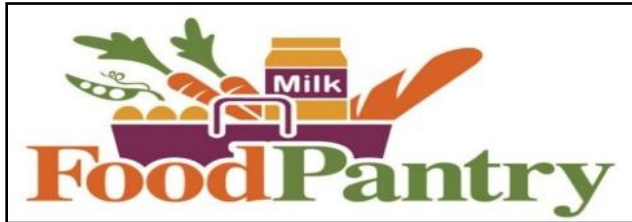

Our congregation has a fund that helps with small emergencies such as needing gas, groceries, and medications, but we also keep an emergency fund for the moments when larger emergencies happen. This is the Benevolence Fund. It is used to help people in very difficult situations.

For instance, it has helped supply funds to a church member who had to go to Denver for medical treatment with a friend as a driver; we helped with their gas and motel room costs. In another case, our congregation was

able to help a family with a mortgage payment that kept them from losing their home.

Drastic emergencies do not happen often, but when they do there is seldom time to gather the needed funds. The Benevolence Fund enables us as a church to move quickly to meet large needs.
