Pastor's Page

"A New Year"

Evie and I enjoyed our Christmas celebrations. Three unique and delightful Christmas Eve services, followed by a Christmas morning gathering in the Fellowship Hall. A big thanks to all who helped make

each and all of these services into beautiful opportunities to worship and give thanks for God's greatest gift to us: Jesus Christ!

After watching some football and taking a nice nap on Christmas afternoon, we received our Christmas dinner guests, friends from Minnesota who were passing through on their way back home from skiing in Colorado. Evie prepared a fabulous meal, and one of our guests played the cello for us between dinner and dessert. We finished the evening with a simple, yet challenging board game.

In the morning, we fed our guests again and helped them find the best route to travel among the questionable roads marking the Dakotas of late. Another nap, and then we loaded up and headed to Deadwood for a night out. I had started feeling a bit under the weather on Sunday, but I wasn't going to miss our plans for our Christmas and Evie's birthday celebration. We had a fun night in Deadwood before heading to Rapid City for a bit of post-Christmas shopping.

On the way home, I decided I would take a home test for COVID, just to make sure it was a common cold that I was dealing with. I'd had my 3rd booster on the Monday before Christmas, so I wasn't all that concerned—until the test came back positive! So, I've moved into the basement for the next several days.

Having successfully avoided COVID for almost three years, it's interesting to reflect on the journey. I really got the sense that COVID could be seen (not by God, but by me) as a metaphor for sin. Before I go any further, I want to be clear that I am intentionally avoiding any political analysis, so please don't read any into what I'm reflecting on here.

So here we go...

For (almost) three years, I've been able to avoid COVID. When the pandemic first arrived, I was traveling regularly from Nebraska to Massachusetts. I took the regular precautions, and it was nice to be on relatively empty airplanes. I was also working part-time as a hospital chaplain, so I was one of the first to receive the vaccine, and received timely booster shots as well. I made it through my travel and chaplaincy experiences unscathed.

I lost a close friend early on to the disease, a golfing buddy who was also the husband of our conference superintendent. It was terrifying to see the isolation he experienced. I also heard from my sister-in-law, who was very frustrated to have gotten the virus despite all her attempts to avoid it. She also works in a hospital setting, with all the vaccinations available. She was "banished" to the basement for quarantine not just once, but twice.

In both of these cases, there seemed to be a stigma operating, attaching itself to the COVID virus. If you got it, you must have done something wrong. You failed to follow the protocols correctly. It didn't seem to matter whether or not you were vaccinated, but if you got it, it was somehow your fault. And folks like me, who sailed along without catching it, began to feel like we must have superior immune systems and/or protective protocols.

Here's my confession: Because I didn't get it, I felt superior to those who did. I didn't brag openly about it, it was just there, somewhere below the surface.

How is this a metaphor for sin? I can think of several ways:

- One can become prideful about not falling into some forms of sin.
- There are sins that are not even remotely attractive to us, and it's easy to shame others who fall into that sort of sin.
- Sin (and its punishment) is seen as the root cause of various illnesses (cf. John 9). The illness, and its ill effects, are the fault of the sinner.
- Sin leads to exclusion (eg. Quarantine) and shame.
- Sin eventually gets to everyone, and we all need a cure (Romans 3:23-24)

I'm sure there are numerous other ways that this pandemic serves as a metaphor for sin, but it's even better to remember that God has given us a remedy that can lead us back to health. It's the gift of Jesus, who took our sin/illness upon himself, and then brought it to the cross with him to die. And when Jesus rose from the dead, sin didn't rise with him—it stayed dead. And during Jesus' ministry, sin and illness were both overcome by his presence among them.

The Kingdom of God exists among and yet without sin and illness. It has arrived and been victorious with Jesus, and it awaits its completion with his return. In the meantime, we try to avoid sin (and COVID) but sometimes fail. Rather than dwell in shame, Jesus invites us to be healed. Which is exactly what I'm doing now, in the basement, with a nice warm fire and a bowl of chicken noodle soup.

May God richly bless you as we enter a new year together.

For fellowship time after worship there will be small coffee






theme for 2023 is Follow Me (Call to be fishers of people), and our scripture is Matthew 4:19-20.

Council Highlights

December 14, 2022

Members Present

Pastor John, Janelle Jones, Peggy Bosch, John Swanson, Colleen McKirdy, Brenda Swanson, Beth Bentley, and Kelvin Lower

Nominations Discussion

- Colleen asked for an update on the nominations process.
- Pastor John stated that he thought it was going well.
 The nominating committee was supposed to meet today but was postponed. Most committees have appointed new members without the help of the nominations committee.
- Pastor John is most concerned about finding the Stewardship and Finance committee members.
 Clyde Smith is planning on making phone calls to fill the positions.
- Colleen asked about the Missions Committee progress and offered to help in this area.
- Clyde Smith is also working with Pastor John in trying to find a replacement for Peggy B., UMC treasurer.

Values Workshop

• Janelle reported that 6 people have now been trained in our area to run the Values Workshop. The next step will be to schedule a date for the workshop.

Action Items

Staff Raises

- SPR recommended to Council that the staff receive a 5% raise.
 - Janelle moved that Council concur with Staff Parish and offer a 5% raise. John seconded and the motion passed unanimously.
 - Peggy will then send this information to Stewardship and Finance and they will vote to send the final budget back to Council. At that time, Peggy will ask for final approval.
 - Kelvin suggested the final approval from Council wait until January.

Finances

- Peggy informed Council on the budget issues for 2022.
 - Peggy said we as a congregation did very well in November. We closed the gap but we also had a big insurance payment so we are still \$30,000 in the hole for the year. But we do have 'padding' to cover the loss.
- Peggy did not have any information on the Christmas bonuses.

<u>Treasurer's Report – November 2022 (Peggy Bosch)</u> **Balance Sheet** – No major changes. General Fund – For the month of November income for the General Fund is \$45,838.69 and expenses are \$45,760.41. The ending balance for the month of November is \$78.28 in the black with all apportionments paid for the year. The year-to-date balance is \$29,638.13 in the red. November was a good month for income due to educating the congregation about the GF situation and to the Close the Gap campaign initiated by Mary Kennon. However, expenses were also high due to an insurance payment.

UMCOC Fund – For November the income for UMCOC is \$4,350.00 and expenses are \$7,486.36. The ending balance for the month of November is \$3,136.36 in the red. The year-to-date balance is \$5,492.47 in the red. High expenses for the month were due to an insurance payment and some repairs.

<u>Children First</u> – Income for November for Children First is \$44,219.60 including grant money to help with salaries. Expenses are \$42,752.61. The CF Fund ended the third month of their fiscal year in the black \$1,466.99. The year-to-date balance is \$11,007.08.

Debt Retirement/Capital Fund – The Debt Retirement/Capital Fund income for November is \$3,219.13 and expenses are \$3,675.03. The expenses were from the Capital part of the Fund for refurbishing the Cross and Flame on the south side of the church building and for replacing two toilets at UMCOC. Balance at the end of November is \$61,373.80.

Mission-Giving – Mission-giving for November is \$2,890.00. Mission expenses (distributions) are \$3,018.39 including \$1,175 for Pastor's Discretionary. The Mission of the Month is UMCOR for which \$670.00 was collected and sent to the Conference. UMCOR Ukraine raised \$400.00 which was sent to the Conference as well.

Mission of the Month Honduras Medical Mission Team

Except for the 2 COVID years, since 2002 Spearfish UMC has sent 1-2 medical/dental teams a year to Honduras.

This year's team will again be working in the remote southeast section of



Honduras, the poorest area of that very poor country. We

will be staying at the guest house at Send Hope (check out www.send-hope.org) and providing care to the Send Hope youth and people in villages in surrounding areas, working with local mission and healthcare people. The crops in that area have been wiped out by 2 hurricanes in 2021 and extreme flooding in 2020, increasing poverty and malnutrition.

COVID has kept all volunteer teams away, so medical supplies and medicine are even more scarce than usual and the need for care is increased.

We need your help. Team members pay their own way and attempt to raise money for medicine and supplies. Please help by your generous donations to the January mission of the month and help us treat lots of families in Honduras.
